1.0 Overview of Canada Council funding to Alberta in 2006-07

- In 2006-07, the Canada Council for the Arts provided grants totaling over \$8.8 million to the arts in Alberta.
- In addition to grants, \$395,202 in payments was provided to 775 authors through the Public Lending Right Program in 2006-07.¹ This brings the total amount of Canada Council funding to Alberta to over \$9.2 million.
- The Canada Council awarded \$929,548 in grants to 116 Alberta artists and \$7.9 million to 131 Alberta arts organizations. 10% of the grants awarded in the province went to individuals, while 90% were awarded to organizations.
- Grants were awarded to artists and arts organizations in Alberta in each artistic discipline – dance, interdisciplinary and performance art, media arts, music, theatre, visual arts and writing and publishing. In 2006-07, the largest amount of funding went to music (\$2.2 million). Theatre received the second largest amount of funding (\$1.8 million), followed by visual arts (\$1.1 million).
- 889 applications from Alberta artists and arts organizations were submitted to the Canada Council in 2006-07, representing 5.7% of the total number of applications received.
- Funding to artists and arts organizations in Calgary totaled \$4.5 million, comprising 51.1% of the total funding going to the province. Edmonton received \$3.5 million in funds (39.3% of total funding), while Banff received \$296,625 and Lethbridge received \$287,850. 23 additional communities in Alberta including Cochrane, Medicine Hat and Red Deer were awarded funds in 2006-07.
- In 2006-07, Alberta artists received 4.4% of Canada Council funding to artists, and Alberta arts organizations received 6.6% of the funding to arts organizations. In total, Alberta artists and arts organizations received 6.3% of Canada Council funding. In comparison, the province makes up 8.9% of Canadian artists,² and 10.4% of the Canadian population.³
- As a result of the increase to the Canada Council's parliamentary appropriation (for the fiscal years 2006-07 and 2007-08) announced in the federal budget of May 2006, 32 arts organizations in Alberta received \$2.6 million over a two year period as part of the Supplementary Operating Funds Initiative.
- 57 Alberta artists and arts professionals served as peer assessors in 2006-07, making up 7.3% of all peer assessors.

2.0 Statistical highlights about the arts in Alberta⁴

- Two-thirds of Alberta's 11,700 artists reside in Calgary (4,575) or Edmonton (3,095).
- Artists represent 0.8% of the local labour force in Calgary and Edmonton, putting them third and fourth on the ranking of the ten large cities of the Prairie. At 0.6%, Medicine Hat, Lethbridge and Red Deer are sixth, seventh and eighth. St. Albert and Strathcona County are ninth and tenth with 0.5%.
- Among large Prairie cities, the percentage increase in the number of artists from 1991 to 2001 was highest in Calgary (46%), Medicine Hat (30%) and Edmonton (21%).
- Among large Prairie cities, it is in Calgary where artists have the highest average earnings. At only \$21,500, however, artists' average earnings in Calgary are 42% lower than average earnings in the overall local labour force. Across Canada, artists' average earnings (\$23,500) are 26% less than other workers.
- Albertans spent "\$3.0 billion on cultural goods and services in 2005, or 3.3% of total consumer spending in the province. The \$3.0 billion in consumer spending on culture is nearly six times larger than the \$540 million spent on culture in Alberta by all levels of government in 2003/04. This is the highest consumer-to-government spending ratio of all the provinces. On a per capita basis, Albertans' cultural spending is the highest of all provinces at \$971 per resident."⁵

Examples of Canada Council funding in Alberta⁶

The Canada Council supports the endeavours of professional artists and arts organizations through its programs. The following selection illustrates the scope of the activities supported by the Canada Council in Alberta.

In 2006-07 **Linh Ly** of Calgary received an **Assistance to Visual Artists - Project** grant of **\$12,000** to photograph the architectural forms of women's culture in Beijing, China. During her one-month visit **Ly** will explore her idea of 'architectures of women' - the places where mothers are restricted - such as industrial sights, workplaces and night clubs. **Ly** wrote: "Where do women in Beijing transform themselves from 'workers' to other roles? Is history interested in these details? What can a Canadian mother as artist say about one of the most dynamic social and economical changes in the world?" Using thousands of photographs as raw material **Ly** will create art objects resembling mural-sized tapestries.

Composer and performer **Terri (Teresa) Hron** of Edmonton received **\$1,000** from the **Travel Grants to Professional Musicians** program in 2006-07 to participate in a residency with William Duckworth at the Atlantic Center for the Arts in Florida from May 15 to June 4, 2006. Currently living in the Netherlands, **Hron** chose to attend this residency because of its relevance to her current project entitled ***Bird on a Wire: Exploring the Electrical Edge of the Recorder***. During the residency **Hron** created a new work called ***A Little Bird Told Me***, which she premiered at the closing performance and received virtual technology and animation assistance in building her personal website.

The Aboriginal Wing Magazine (TAW), located in Cochrane, received **\$20,000** from the **Grants to Aboriginal Writers, Storytellers and Publishers** program to publish its second issue in 2007. Available in English, French and German, **TAW** is dedicated to promoting "inter-cultural communication between Canadian First Nations people, Canadians and Europeans." The winter 2007 edition includes the feature article entitled ***Calls of the Wild***, which highlights the importance of wolves while dispelling myths, an interview with Cree actress Stacey Da Silva and information about INDIANER & INUIT: The North American Native Film Festival 2007, which took place from March 21 to 25 in Germany.

First-time grant recipient **Terrance Houle**, an Aboriginal media artist from Calgary, received **\$1,000** from the **Travel Grants to Media Artists** program to attend two exhibitions featuring his work. **Houle** first traveled to Toronto for the opening of the multimedia exhibition **Wagon Burner, This! Princess Moonrider, That!** at A Space gallery on September 9, 2006. He then traveled to Ottawa for Carleton University Art Gallery's exhibition **RED EYE** which opened on September 11, 2006. **Houle** gave an artist talk/presentation at each location allowing him to showcase his work to artists, students and the general public in a professional manner relating to each exhibition.

Edmonton poet **Catherine Owen** received **\$15,000** from the **Grants to Professional Writers - Creative Writing** program in 2006-07 to work on a poetry collection celebrating two pioneer women photographers, entitled **Seeing Lessons**. The manuscript will be divided in two sections, **The Light Gatherer** and **Agitate**, both set in BC. The first section will be a narrative sequence in the form of journal entries, lyrics and letters starting in 1888 when "Mattie Gunterman, pioneer photographer, starts to learn the idiosyncratic rudiments of her trade..." The second, executed in long poem form, will take place 60 years later and trace the adventurous journey of a contemporary female photographer.

The **Jean A. Chalmers Fund for the Crafts** awarded **\$7,000** to Medicine Hat's **Medalta International Artist in Residence Program (MIAIR)** to create a ceramic exhibition and artist residency. The residency was facilitated by **Anita Rocamora** and **Linda Sormin** and occurred from May 29 to June 23, 2006. Each of the 13 participants gave a lecture and a demonstration of their techniques. The **Canadian Contemporary Ceramics Exhibition** took place at The Esplanade Art Gallery from May 13 to July 9, 2006. The exhibition included artwork by 27 ceramists from Rankin Inlet to BC. Les Manning, the artistic director of **MIAIR** wrote: "these events facilitated increased public awareness and understanding of ceramic art."

In September 2006 Calgary's **Newzones Gallery of Contemporary Art** will promote the work of Canadian visual artists at the ART212 Contemporary Art Fair in New York with the aid of a **\$5,000** grant awarded by the **Audience and Market Development** office. **Newzones** was the only gallery from Western Canada at ART212. This allowed them to make new international contacts, reconnect with former clients, and generate sales and exposure for the Gallery's artists. Artists represented by **Newzones** include Bradley Harms (Calgary), Cathy Daley (Toronto), Sophie Jodoin (Montreal) and Cybèle Young (Toronto).

The **Theatre** section awarded **\$13,176** to **BASHd!**, an independent theatre production company based in Edmonton, for the creation and development of a musical theatre/rap performance. **BASHd!** was written and produced by actors **Chris Craddock** and **Nathan Cukow** and performed at Roost Niteclub in Edmonton from September 28 to October 7, 2006. First-time grant applicant and recipient **Chris Cukow** wrote that through the use of rap songs and spoken word poetry **BASHd!** "explodes assumptions about distinct categories of race, gender and sexual orientation, while exploring the discrimination and oppression of both sides of the coin, as we all try to co-exist in a free and equal society."

The **Assistance to Practitioners, Critics and Curators in Architecture** program awarded **Frederick Valentine** with a **\$20,000** grant to organize a retrospective of his career in architecture with an accompanying catalogue. The exhibition entitled **The Architecture of L. Frederick Valentine: Career Works 1963-2005** took place from September 7 to October 28, 2006 at the Triangle Gallery of Visual Arts, a non-profit organization in Calgary. **Valentine** wrote that the show was organized to tell the story of his life and career and show influences and cycles of direction through the display of his works including models, original drawings, photographs and associated ephemera (mock-ups, news articles, publications, etc.).

The band **Polyjesters** from Carstairs received **\$3,000** from the **Music Touring Grants** program to go on a tour of seven cities in the Maritime Provinces from September 28 to October 7, 2006. The members of **Polyjesters** include **Jason Valleau** on bass, **Sheldon Valleau** on baritone ukulele, **Matthew Woodward** on fiddle and **Aaron Young** on guitar. While on tour the **Polyjesters** performed original compositions, displayed ukulele and fiddle techniques and promoted their band in radio interviews. Of the experience one band member wrote, "The acceptance of our tunes by an entirely different region of Canada reinforced our plans to continue our song writing endeavours and plan for the development of another CD."

In 2006-07 **The Banff Centre, Theatre Arts** was awarded **\$1,625** by the **Grants for the Translation of Canadian Theatre Works** program for the translation of Pascal Chevarie's ***Mika, l'enfant pleureur (Mika, the Boy Who Couldn't Stop Crying)*** from French to English. ***Mika***, a play intended for audiences aged seven to twelve, is about a sad boy who decides to put his grief to good use by finding a legendary volcano whose roaring fire can only be extinguished by tears. Throughout the journey ***Mika*** encounters friendship and uncertainty but never loses faith in his mission to extinguish the volcano. Governor General Literary Award winner and broadcaster, journalist, dramaturge and translator **Linda Gaboriau** translated the play.

Edmonton's **Mile Zero Dance Society** received **\$2600** from **The Japan-Canada Fund** and **\$400** from the **Visiting Foreign Artists Pilot Program** to bring Japanese dance artist **Mari Osanai** to Edmonton. **Osanai** conducted classes and workshops at the Open Studio, Showing and Artist's Talk and created a new work entitled ***In the Room***, which she performed at The Landing Pad from October 17 to 30, 2006. **Osanai's** Noguchi Taiso style is a form of Japanese gymnastics developed after World War II by the late professor Noguchi Taiso "as his response to the aggression he saw in the world. The movements he developed consciously reflect forms and cycles of nature, and his lessons were not only physical but philosophical."

The **Calgary Animated Objects Society** presented programming at the International Festival of Animated Objects from January 19 to 28, 2007 in Calgary with the support of a **\$25,000** grant from the **Multidisciplinary Festivals Project Grants** program. Funds supported ***Our Traditions***, a new programming initiative that introduced the work of 28 Aboriginal artists to new audiences via public performances, lectures and residences. Media Artist **Archer Pechawis** collaborated with actress **Jerilynn Webster** to create the performance ***Young Spirit Voices***, in which young emerging Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal artists shared their stories onstage after weeks of intensive creation and training.

The **Visual Arts - Supplementary Operating Funds Initiative** awarded a grant of **\$20,000** to Edmonton's **Society of Northern Alberta Print Artists (SNAP)** to present the **2008 Edmonton Print International (EPI)**. The **EPI** will be a multilayered event including an exhibition of the most innovative prints and print-based art being produced in the world, an artist symposium, public education programs and a print publication. The event will "contribute to the growing awareness of Canadian culture by showcasing a large number of Canadian print artists as well as bringing in the work of print artists from around the world."

With a **\$5,000** grant from the **Spoken Word and Storytelling Program**, the **Alberta League Encouraging Storytelling (T.A.L.E.S)**, located in Spruce Grove, held its 18th annual Storytelling Festival at Fort Edmonton from September 3 to 4, 2006. Performers from across Canada were invited to the festival and contributed to storytelling sessions, workshops and an evening storytelling presentation. Performers included **Sarah Granskou** from Ontario, **John David Hickey** and **Dylan Willcock** from Quebec and **Normal Walker** from Saskatchewan. Of the three stages at the festival, one was focused on a child audience to allow for more family participation.

The **Grants to Dance Professionals: Emerging/Mid-Career** program awarded **George Williams** of Calgary a grant in the amount of **15,000** to research and present **The Kansas City Shuffle** from December 2006 to April 2007. The **Shuffle** is a choreography for the audience to be performed in the public spaces of the theatre, which "targets the social spaces such as the lobby and bar and aims to activate them with suspicion, intrigue, conspiracy and collision in order to manipulate the body into sensing shifts in consciousness." Participants were initiated into the performance by secretly accepting packages containing a score based on narratives chosen from classic thriller and espionage films.

4.0 Overall arts and culture funding in Alberta by all three levels of government⁷

- Arts and culture funding to Alberta from all three levels of government stood at \$537.3 million in 2003-04 (the latest year of overall data from Statistics Canada).
- Provincial funding made up the largest share at 37% (\$198.5 million) followed by municipal funding at 35% (\$185.9 million). Federal funding made up the smallest share at 28% (\$152.8 million).
- Federal government cultural funding to Alberta totalling \$152.8 million is primarily concentrated (86%) in three areas – heritage resources (historic parks/sites and nature/provincial parks), broadcasting, and film and video. The remaining 14% is distributed to areas including performing arts (\$9.4 million), literary arts (\$3.7 million) and multidisciplinary arts (\$4.0 million). In the comparable year (2003-04), Canada Council funding accounted for 5% of all federal cultural spending in Alberta.
- Between 1999-00 and 2003-04, federal cultural spending in Alberta increased from \$117 million to \$152.8 million (an increase of 31%). Over the same period, Canada Council funding to Alberta increased from \$6.8 million to \$7.8 million.
- The largest part of provincial government funding is concentrated in three areas: libraries, heritage resources and arts education (76% or \$151 million). Funding is also allocated by the provincial government to multidisciplinary arts (\$12.2 million), performing arts (\$11.7 million), film and video (\$10.7 million) and visual arts and crafts (\$5.5 million).

Canada Council for the Arts funding to Alberta

- Since 1999-00, Canada Council funding to Alberta has increased, rising from \$6.8 million to \$8.9 million in 2006-07 (a significant increase of 30.49%).
- Grants to Alberta in terms of percentage of total Canada Council funding has decreased slightly from 6.59% in 1999-00 to 6.29% in 2006-07.

Grant applications from Alberta

- Since 1999-00 the total number of grant applications from Alberta artists and arts organizations as a percentage of total Canada Council grant applications has decreased substantially from 6.55% in 1999-00 to 5.68% in 2006-07. The total number of grant applications from Alberta has decreased significantly by 9.10% over an eight year span, from 1999-00 to 2006-07.

Alberta – Various comparisons with other provinces⁸

- In terms of its level of funding, Alberta is in fourth place at 6.29%, i.e. the same rank as its share of applications, share of artists and share of population. Like four other provinces, Alberta's share of funding is higher than its share of applications. The share of applications from Alberta is significantly lower than the province's share of artists and share of population. The result is that Alberta is in 12th place in terms of Canada Council funding on a per capita basis per province, at \$2.69.
