1.0 Overview of Canada Council funding to Northwest Territories in 2006-07

- In 2006-07, the Canada Council for the Arts provided grants totalling \$214,045 to the arts in Northwest Territories.
- In addition to grants, \$4,105 in payments was provided to six authors through the Public Lending Right Program in 2006-07.¹ This brings the total amount of funding to the Northwest Territories to \$218,150.
- The Council distributed \$57,200 in funds to six artists and \$156,845 to seven Northwest Territories arts organizations in 2006-07.
- Grants were awarded to artists and arts organizations in the Northwest Territories in music, media arts, visual arts, writing and publishing, and interdisciplinary art, as well as through the Aboriginal Arts Secretariat. In 2006-07, the largest amount of funding went to writing and publishing (\$52,545), followed by music (\$22,500) and media arts (\$20,000).
- 26 applications from Northwest Territories artists and arts organizations were submitted to Council in 2006-07, representing 0.2% of the total number of received applications.
- Funding to artists and arts organizations in Yellowknife totaled \$101,700 comprising 47.5% of the total funding going to Northwest Territories. In 2006-07, Fort Simpson received \$49,000, representing 22.9% of total funding, Inuvik received \$35,800 in funds (16.7%) and Fort Smith received \$27,545 in funds (12.9%).
- In 2006-07, Northwest Territories artists received 0.3% of Canada Council funding to artists, and Northwest Territories arts organizations received 0.1% of the funding to arts organizations. In total, Northwest Territories artists and arts organizations received 0.15% of Canada Council funding. In comparison, the Northwest Territories makes up 0.13% of the total population of Canada,² and 0.1% of Canadian artists.³
- One artist from Northwest Territories served as peer assessors in 2006-07, comprising 0.1% of all peer assessors.

2.0 Statistical highlights about the arts in Northwest Territories

- Close to \$42 million was spent on culture by all levels of government in the Northwest Territories in 2003-2004. Per capita cultural spending ranks first among provinces/territories in terms of the federal contribution (\$722) and second in terms of the provincial/territorial investment (\$228).⁴
- In 2001, the highest concentration of Aboriginal artists occurs in Canada's three territories. Combined, the Yukon, the Northwest Territories and Nunavut are home to close to 400 Aboriginal artists, 54% of the total number of artists in the territories (nearly 700).⁵

3.0 Highlights of Canada Council grants to Northwest Territories artists and arts organizations

Arts organizations

The Canada Council supports the work of arts organizations. In 2006-07, some of the Northwest Territories arts organizations that received funding were:

Examples of Canada Council funding in Northwest Territories⁶

The Canada Council supports the endeavours of professional artists and arts organizations through its programs. The following selection illustrates the scope of the activities supported by the Canada Council in Northwest Territories.

A total of **\$17,800** in Canada Council funds was awarded to the **Inuvialuit Regional Corporation** through the **Elder/Youth Legacy Program: Support for Aboriginal Artistic Practices** pilot program in 2006-07. Community Elder and active printmaker **Mabel Nigiyok** will teach the three-month long workshop at the **Katimavik Language and Cultural Centre** in Ulukhaktok. The participants will listen to tape recordings of traditional stories told by Elders, then learn to take images from the stories, transfer them into illustration and turn them into prints. Through the workshops, **Nigiyok** hopes to pass on the art of printmaking from one generation to the next, thus keeping the tradition alive.

Dene artist **Antoine Mountain** of Yellowknife received his first grant of **\$1,200** through the **Aboriginal Peoples Collaborative Exchange Travel Grants** program to attend and participate in the North Residency at the Banff Centre in 2007. During the residency, **Mountain** collaborated with Haida Gwaii story teller Roberta Kennedy to create **Eagle and Raven Fighting Over the Light**, a painting which pays homage to the origins of an ancient legend. Of the painting **Mountain** wrote: "I have intentionally kept my painting style very graphic rendering an almost crayon-like surface, to appeal to the children of the future who will view this work and listen to the story it depicts."

Paul Fortin of Inuvik received a grant of **\$15,500** through the **Visual Arts** section to complete a residency at **Caribbean Contemporary Arts (CCA)** in Port of Spain, Trinidad and Tobago. During his residency, from November 10, 2006 to January 5, 2007, **Fortin** created installations that develop relationships between architectural form, natural environments and common materials. While living and working with four artists from Latin America and China, **Fortin** was able to travel and develop an exhibition at the **CCA**'s Inter-Americas Gallery in which he exhibited the large installation work entitled **Boca del Drago/Boca del Sierpe** that he created during his residency.

The **Mary Kaeser Library** in Fort Smith received a **\$7,545** grant through the **Literary Readings and Festivals** program to host a reading series that will travel to several communities in the Northwest Territories. From July 1, 2006 to June 30, 2007, **Dan Yashinksy**, **Joseph Boyden**, **Jacqueline Guest** and **Margriet Ruurs** will give public readings at four different libraries. The authors will also work with community organizations to conduct school visits, workshops and other performances.

Métis (Tso'Tine-Polish) artist, author and researcher **Bren (Brenda) Kolson** from Yellowknife was the recipient of a **\$5,000** grant through the **Grants to Aboriginal Writers, Storytellers and Publishers** program in 2006-07. With this grant **Kolson** will complete and edit her book entitled **Snuff Bag MacEar and Bold Shiver Souls. Kolson** writes that her book is based on her life experiences but is also part fiction and "comprises a series of short stories as told by a Métis child." Additional characters will be inter-woven throughout the book to frame its format and unify the text.

Fort Smith's **NWT Cree Language Program** received its first grant from the **Grants to Aboriginal Writers, Storytellers and Publishers** program in the amount of **\$20,000** to assist in the development of a series of five books entitled **Pi's Adventures** in 2006-07. The life and adventures of Pi Kennedy, a well-known young Métis trapper in the Northwest Territories, will be published in Cree and English. The series will facilitate passing on Pi's vast knowledge, as he has always wished he had children to teach about living on the land. The books, designed for pre-school children, will explore elements of touch and feel, illustrations, search and find, and include short stories.

In 2006-07 Yellowknife's **Western Arctic Moving Pictures (WAMP) Co-op** was awarded two grants from the **Media Arts** section totalling **\$20,000** for equipment acquisition and operating assistance. With these funds **WAMP** plans to purchase various software and hardware including a miniDVD camera, a lighting kit and an external hard drive. Operational initiatives include streamlining fundraising activities, writing and implementing policies and developing the media arts community in Yellowknife. **WAMP**'s mission is: "to promote, encourage, support and showcase the production of independent film, video, audio and digital media with the social, cultural and artistic community of the Northwest Territories."

4.0 Overall arts and culture funding in Northwest Territories by all three levels of government⁷

- Arts and culture funding to the Northwest Territories from all three levels of government stood at \$42.0 million in 2003-04 (the latest year of overall data from Statistics Canada).
- Federal funding made up the largest share at 73% (\$30.5 million) with another 23% (\$9.6 million) coming from provincial sources. The remaining 4% (\$1.9 million) of total government expenditures to the Northwest Territories came from municipal sources.
- Federal government cultural funding to the Northwest Territories, totalling \$30.5 million, is primarily concentrated (96%) in two areas broadcasting and heritage resources (historic parks/sites and nature/provincial parks). The remaining 4% of funding (\$1.2 million) is allocated to areas including performing arts (\$754,000), multidisciplinary arts (\$196,000) and literary arts (\$76,000). In the comparable year (2003-04), Canada Council funding accounted for 0.4% of all federal cultural spending in the Northwest Territories.
- Between 1999-00 and 2003-04, federal cultural spending in the Northwest Territories decreased from \$36 million to \$30.5 million (a decrease of 14%). During the same period, Canada Council funding to the Northwest Territories increased from \$97,900 to \$157,665.
- The largest part of provincial government funding is concentrated in three areas heritage resources, libraries, and broadcasting (94% or \$9.0 million). However, funding is also allocated by the provincial government to multidisciplinary arts (\$559,000) and performing arts (\$61,000).

5.0 Detailed tables of Canada Council funding to Northwest Territories

Canada Council for the Arts funding to Northwest Territories

- From 1999-00 to 2006-07, Canada Council funding to the Northwest Territories increased, rising from \$97,900 to \$214,045, a significant increase of 118.64%. The funding in the last three fiscal years varied very much, going from an increase of 51% in 2003-04, to a decrease of 37% in 2004-05, to an increase of 87% in 2005-06, and to an increase of 16% in 2006-07.
- Grants to the Northwest Territories as a percentage of total Canada Council funding has remained the same as last year at 0.15%.

Grant applications from Northwest Territories

Since 1999-00 the total number of grant applications from Northwest Territories artists and arts organizations decreased from 34 in 1999-00 to 26 in 2006-07, a decrease of 23.53%. However, the number of grant applications has varied a lot during that period, when the average was 27. The Northwest Territories' percentage share of grant applications has varied between 0.10% and 0.23%. In 2006-07, the share of grant applications from the Northwest Territories to the Canada Council is slightly higher than both its share of population and share of artists – see Table 7.

Northwest Territories – Various comparisons with other provinces⁸

• The Northwest Territories ranks fifth in terms of its level of Canada Council funding on a per capita basis per province at \$5.16. The Northwest Territories is last in terms of its share of funding. The Northwest Territories' share of funding is slightly lower than its percentage share of grant applications but is slightly higher than both its share of population and share of artists.
