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Overview of Canada Council funding to Prince Edward Island in 2008-09 1.0

- In 2008-09, the Canada Council for the Arts provided grants totalling \$305,375 to the arts in Prince Edward Island.
- In addition to grants, 63 Prince Edward Island authors received \$37,368 in payments through the Public Lending Right Commission in 2008-09. 1 This brings the total funding to Prince Edward Island to \$342,743.
- The Canada Council awarded \$11,000 in grants to two artists and \$294,375 to ten Prince Edward Island arts organizations in 2008-09.
- Grants were awarded to artists and arts organizations in Prince Edward Island in media arts, music, theatre, visual arts and writing and publishing. In 2008-09, the largest amount of funding went to visual arts (\$155,400), while media arts received the second largest amount (\$57,400), followed by music (\$49,000).
- 46 applications from Prince Edward Island artists and arts organizations were submitted to the Canada Council in 2008-09, representing 0.3% of the total number of applications received.
- Funding to artists and arts organizations in Charlottetown totalled \$277,625, comprising 90.9% of the total funding going to Prince Edward Island. The community of Wellington Station received the \$23,000 or 7.5% of total funding in 2008-09. Three other communities received \$4,750 representing 1.6% of total funding.
- In 2008-09, Prince Edward Island artists received 0.1% of Canada Council funding to artists, and Prince Edward Island arts organizations received 0.2% of the funding to arts organizations. In total, Prince Edward Island artists and arts organizations received 0.2% of Canada Council funding. In comparison, the province makes up 0.4% of the total population of Canada,² and 0.3% of Canadian artists.3
- Four artists from Prince Edward Island served as a peer assessor in 2008-09, comprising 0.5% of all peer assessors.

2.0 Statistical highlights about the arts in Prince Edward Island⁴

- In 2006, there were 470 artists on Prince Edward Island, representing 0.58% of the overall provincial labour force.
- Between 1991 and 2006 the number of artists on Prince Edward Island increased by 18% which is slightly higher than the population increase (14%) over the same period. The number of artists increased by 27% between 1991 and 2001, but decreased by 7% between 2001 and 2006.
- The median earnings of artists on Prince Edward Island were \$8,800 in 2006, less than half of the typical earnings of all PEI workers (\$19,500).
- In 2006, the broader cultural sector labor force on Prince Edward Island has about 2,000 workers. That means that one in every 41 people in the province has a cultural occupation.
- Prince Edward Islanders spent \$94 million on cultural goods and services in 2005, which equals
 3.4% of total consumer spending in the province. The \$94 million in consumer spending on
 culture is three times higher than the \$30 million spent on culture in Prince Edward Island by all
 levels of government in 2003-04. On a per capita basis, Islanders' cultural spending ranks seventh
 among the provinces at \$712 per resident.
- In 2005, the three most popular cultural and heritage activities in Prince Edward Island were: reading newspapers (92% of the population 15 or older); listening to music on CD's, cassette tapes, DVD audio discs, records, etc. (80%); and reading a magazine (77%).
- In 2005, 36% of Prince Edward Islanders 15 or older (40,000 residents) attended a concert or performance by professional artists of music, dance, theatre or opera (excluding cultural festivals). This is less than the Canadian rate of 41%.

Examples of Canada Council funding in Prince Edward Island⁵

The Canada Council supports the endeavours of professional artists and arts organizations through its programs. The following selection illustrates the scope of the activities supported by the Canada Council in Prince Edward Island.

A grant of \$10,000 was awarded to Pascal Miousse of Wellington Station, P.E.I., through the Grants to Professional Musicians: Individuals in the Non-Classical Music category to create and compose new musical arrangements. Over the course of an eight-month period, Miousse will rely on traditional instruments such as the violin, mandolin, banjo and guitar to create new melodies inspired by rock, folk, jazz, and blues. While basing much of his work on more traditional styles of composition, the musician hopes his original writing techniques will produce unique and creative arrangements. Miousse hopes to increase his opportunities as a solo artist, as well as bring new excitement to the music of his band, Vishten.

In 2008-09, **Acorn Press** of Charlottetown, P.E.I., was awarded **\$5,300** through the **Book Publishing Support: Translation Grants** program for the translation of Georges Arsenault's book *La Mi-Carême en Acadie* (*Acadian Mi-Careme: Masks and Merrymaking*). For hundreds of years, the people of Acadia have celebrated Mi-Careme (Mid-Lent) by dressing up in masks and costumes, while distributing candies to good children and threatening to kidnap naughty ones. A prominent Acadian historian and folklorist, Arsenault wrote the book to honour this celebration tracing its evolution, highlighting modern-day festivities, and considering its role in Acadian culture. The book was translated by **Sally Roos** to further enhance the understanding of Acadian culture and tradition.

Through the Audience and Market Development Travel Grants: International program, Charlottetown folk-band Nudie and the Turks received \$2,600 to showcase at the Folk Alliance International Conference in Memphis, Tennessee, in February 2009. The invitation provided the band with an excellent opportunity to connect with folk/roots presenters and agents across Canada and the North-Eastern United States, while networking with peers and gaining a greater perspective of the music industry. The band received five performance offers, as well as an invitation to participate in the Americana Music Conference in Nashville. As a result of participation in this event, Nudie and the Turks successfully launched itself into the North American folk/roots scene and has since built a stronger professional profile, proving that "fishing isn't the only thing East Coasters are good at."

The **Confederation Centre Art Gallery (CCAG)** in Charlottetown was awarded an **Acquisition Assistance for Art Museums and Public Galleries** program grant of **\$4,400** to acquire *Untitled: subjective affinities3* by Jayce Salloum. The work is a series of 16 photographs taken by the artist during his daily travels around Vancouver. The photographs address the social and political realities of individuals and communities from a local perspective, as well as from a global economic and political standpoint. Since the **CCAG** is Canada's living memorial to the dreams of Confederation, the acquisition of Salloum's work acknowledges the pluralities and diversities of the Canadian social and cultural "mosaic," and also broadens the spectrum of photographic work in the **CCAG's** collection.

In 2008-09, the **Service des bibliothèques publiques de l'Île-du-Prince-Édouard**, the French division of P.E.I.'s Public Library Service, based in Summerside, received a **\$3,000** grant through the **Literary Readings and Festivals** program to support a literary readings tour featuring Canadian authors who specialize in French-language children's literature. Over the course of several months, guest authors travelled throughout the Island visiting francophone libraries and schools as a means to disseminate knowledge and excite interest in French literature. For the organization, this initiative is an excellent opportunity to draw attention to the importance of maintaining and promoting Frenchlanguage services, especially within minority francophone communities.

Gadelle, a newly formed traditional Acadian band based in Wellington Station, P.E.I., was awarded \$13,000 through the **Grants for Specialized Music Sound Recording** program to record their first self-titled album. Louise Arsenault and Helene Bergeron, the founders of the group and veterans of the Acadian music scene, are joined by Caroline Bernard and Samantha Gallant to form the band. The artistic focus of the album is to define and reclaim a traditional Acadian sound rooted in the experience of P.E.I. Acadians. As a result, the group hopes to support Acadian music and introduce the next generation of musicians into a vibrant tradition. With the positive audience feedback received at previous performances, **Gadelle** is aspiring to examine international touring possibilities.

Island Media Arts Cooperative (IMAC), based in Charlottetown, received two multi-year grants to enhance its role as a venue for Prince Edward Island's independent media artists: an **Equipment Acquisition Assistance to Media Arts Production Organizations** grant (\$45,000) and an **Annual Assistance to Media Arts Production Organizations** (\$127,200) grant. IMAC focuses on cultural events, educational programming, and public presentations. In 2008-09, the organization hosted two film festivals and the *Remote Control Symposium*, a major event which provided media artists an opportunity to explore the bond between their work and their audience. IMAC also held a number of well-received workshops throughout the year, each highlighting the collective acumen and cooperative spirit of the organization.

Through the Literary Readings and Festivals program, the Department of English at the University of Prince Edward Island (UPEI), located in Charlottetown, received \$2,825 to present the 17th Winter's Tales Author Series, from September 2008 to March 2009. During the recent series, which was presented in conjunction with three other Atlantic Province universities, authors Guy Gavriel Kay, Anne Simpson, Libby Creelman, Ian Colford, David Hickey, and Brian Bartlett presented their works and promoted their books to enthusiastic audiences. The only host of an annual literary series on P.E.I., the English Department of UPEI remains committed to celebrating the work of Canadian authors and strives to coordinate reading tours with other associations to expand literary knowledge throughout the Atlantic region.

A total of \$750 was awarded to Erskine Smith, Artistic Director of the Victoria Playhouse in Victoria, P.E.I., through the Travel Assistance for Theatre Artistic Directors, Administrators and Presenters program, to attend the Suitcase Showcase festival in Toronto in November 2008. During the three-day festival, Smith attended the performances of six travelling plays, each with touching stories and a sense of humour. For the small theatre, the festival provided an opportunity to bring innovative and culturally diverse plays to P.E.I., which in turn helped bring Victoria Playhouse into the mainstream of theatrical presenters. As Smith noted, participating in this event helped close the gap between the Playhouse and its peers in major urban centers.

Through the **Travel Grants to Professional Artists** program in the **Visual Arts, Gerald Beaulieu** of Montague, P.E.I., was awarded **\$1,000** to attend the public presentation of his work at the international exhibition *Global Warming at the Icebox*, in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Through interactive works, multi-media installations, and object-based sculptures, the exhibit engaged the public in exploring creative ways of understanding the problems of climate change. As one of four participating Canadian artists, **Beaulieu** acknowledged that the experience allowed him to assess the critical and aesthetic capacity of his work, while comparing it to the works of other artists working on similar thematic concepts.

In 2008-09, the **Prince Edward Island Symphony Society** was awarded a three-year grant totalling **\$51,000** through the **Professional Orchestra Program**. Since its foundation, the **Symphony** has remained committed to bringing orchestral music to various communities throughout P.E.I., as well as providing performance experience and practical training for professionals, amateurs, and students located in and around Charlottetown. The **Symphony** plans to use the grant to continue its commitment to artistic quality through increasing its partnerships with string educators, and reinforcing relationships with other organizations in the Maritimes. Through these initiatives, the **Symphony** hopes to strengthen P.E.I.'s pool of qualified musicians, thus allowing greater opportunities to travel and perform within the province.

4.0 Overall arts and culture funding in Prince Edward Island by all three levels of government⁶

- Arts and culture funding to Prince Edward Island from all three levels of government stood at \$37.5 million in 2006-07 (the latest year of overall data from Statistics Canada).
- Federal funding made up the largest share at about 52% (\$19.5 million) followed by 37% (\$13.9 million) coming from provincial sources, and 11% (\$4.1 million) of total government expenditures to Prince Edward Island came from municipal sources.
- Federal government cultural funding to Prince Edward Island totalling \$19.5 million is primarily concentrated (93%) in three areas heritage resources (historic parks/sites and nature/provincial parks), broadcasting, and performing arts. The remaining 7% of funding (\$1.3 million) is allocated to areas including multidisciplinary arts (\$870,000), film and video (\$122,000), and visual arts and crafts (\$141,000). In the comparable year (2006-07), Canada Council funding accounted for about 1% of all federal cultural spending in Prince Edward Island.
- Between 2002-03 and 2006-07, federal cultural spending to Prince Edward Island increased from \$18.8 million to \$19.5 million (an increase of 3.9%). During the same period, Canada Council funding in Prince Edward Island decreased from \$368,755 to \$290,200.
- The largest part of provincial government funding is concentrated in three areas libraries, heritage resources and multidisciplinary arts (90% or \$12.5 million). However, funding is also allocated by the provincial government to film and video (\$562,000), visual arts and crafts (\$504,000), and performing arts (\$261,000).

5.0 Detailed tables of Canada Council funding to Prince Edward Island

Canada Council for the Arts funding to Prince Edward Island

- Since 1999-00, Canada Council funding to Prince Edward Island fluctuated from a low of \$258,689 in 2005-06 to a high of \$423,933 in 2007-08. The funding in 2008-09 (\$305,375) is lower (19.14%) than the 1999-00 level.
- Grants to Prince Edward Island as a percentage of total Canada Council funding dropped in the past ten fiscal years, going from 0.37% in 1999-00 to 0.21% in 2008-09.

Grant applications from Prince Edward Island

- In the past ten fiscal years, the number of grant applications in Prince Edward Island ranged from a low of 38 in 2000-01 to a high of 86 in 2003-04. In 2008-09, the Canada Council received 46 grant applications from Prince Edward Island representing 0.30% of all applications.
- In 2008-09, the share of Prince Edward Island as a percentage of total number of Canada Council applications (0.30%) is lower than both its share of population (0.42%) and share of artists (0.34%) see Table 7.

 Prince Edward Island is in last place in terms of its level of Canada Council grant funding on a per capita basis per province at \$2.18. Prince Edward Island's share of grant funding is lower than its percentage share of Canada Council grant applications, percentage share of population, and share of artists.
