1.0 Overview of Canada Council funding to Manitoba in 2007-08

- In 2007-08, the Canada Council for the Arts provided grants totalling over \$6.7 million to the arts in Manitoba.
- In addition to grants, \$173,446 in payments was provided to 420 Manitoba authors through the Public Lending Right program,¹ as well as \$104,750 in special funds in 2007-08. This brings the total amount of Canada Council funding to Manitoba close to \$7.0 million.
- In 2007-08, the Canada Council awarded \$729,318 in grants to 66 Manitoba artists and \$6.0 million to 67 Manitoba arts organizations.
- Grants were awarded to artists and arts organizations in Manitoba in each artistic discipline – dance, interdisciplinary and performance art, media arts, music, theatre, visual arts and writing and publishing. In 2007-08, the largest amount of funding went to dance (\$1.6 million). Music received the second largest amount of funding (\$1.4 million), followed by theatre (\$1.2 million).
- 405 applications from Manitoba artists and arts organizations were submitted to the Canada Council in 2007-08, representing 2.7% of the total number of applications received.
- Funding to artists and arts organizations in Winnipeg totalled \$6.3 million, comprising 94% of the total funding going to the province. Onanole received over \$104,000 in funds, while Brandon received \$86,500. A total of 10 additional communities in Manitoba received \$204,280, or 3% of all funding to the province in 2007-08.
- In 2007-08, Manitoba artists received 3.1% of Canada Council funding to artists, and Manitoba arts organizations received 4.6% of the funding to arts organizations. In total, Manitoba artists and arts organizations received 4.4% of Canada Council funding. In comparison, the province makes up 3.0% of Canadian artists,² and 3.6% of the Canadian population.³
- A total of 24 artists and arts professionals from Manitoba served as peer assessors in 2007-08, comprising 3.1% of all peer assessors.

2.0 Statistical highlights about the arts in Manitoba⁴

- In Manitoba, three-quarters of the province's 4,000 artists reside in Winnipeg (2,965).
- Winnipeg has the second-highest artistic concentration among large Prairie cities (0.9%).
- In Winnipeg, the growth in the arts labour force between 1991 and 2001 was almost eight times the growth in the overall local labour force.
- In Winnipeg, the gap between artists' average earnings (\$19,700) and local labour force earnings is 33%, which is the smallest gap among large Prairie cities. Across Canada, artists' average earnings (\$23,500) are 26% less than other workers.
- Manitobans spent \$850 million on cultural goods and services in 2005, which equals 3.3% of total consumer spending in the province. The \$850 million in consumer spending on culture is over three times larger than the \$260 million spent on culture in Manitoba by all levels of government in 2003-04. On a per capita basis, Manitobans' cultural spending ranks fifth in the country at \$809 per resident.
- In 2005, the three most popular cultural and heritage activities in Manitoba were: reading newspapers (86% of the population 15 or older); listening to music on CD's, cassette tapes, DVD audio discs, records, etc. (80%); and watching a video (rented, purchased, VHS or DVD formats) (77%).
- In 2005, 38% of Manitobans 15 or older (350,000 residents) attended a concert or performance by professional artists of music, dance, theatre or opera (excluding cultural festivals). This is just under the Canadian rate of 41%.

Examples of Canada Council funding in Manitoba⁵

The Canada Council supports the endeavours of professional artists and arts organizations through its programs. The following selection illustrates the scope of the activities supported by the Canada Council in Manitoba.

A total of **\$3,000** was awarded to **Eduardo Aquino** and **Karen Shanski** of Winnipeg through the **Inter-Arts Program: Travel Grants to Professional Artists** to present their jointly created and coordinated work, **Copan Projects**, at Casa Vertigo, in Eindhoven, Netherlands in June 2007. **Copan Projects** is a reflection on the various interpretations of the Copan, a multi-use building in Sao Paulo, Brazil, as represented by its workers, administrators and daily users as well as architects, filmmakers, designers, economists, critics and photographers. This was the first opportunity for **Aquino** and **Shanski** to present **Copan Projects** as a whole in a solo exhibition in Europe. **Aquino** and **Shanski** gave two lectures at the Eindhoven University of Technology in which they discussed their artistic practice and the ideas generated by their project.

The Winnipeg-based, francophone world music group **Chic Gamine** received its first Canada Council grant of **\$7,170** from the **Audience and Market Development Travel Grants Program: International** in 2007-08. With this grant, **Chic Gamine** performed at the Midwest Arts Conference in Columbus, Ohio, and at the Performing Arts Exchange in Louisville, Kentucky, in September 2007. Through these performances, the band gained exposure in the United States and has since received offers to perform in New Mexico, Washington, California, Oregon and New York. **Chic Gamine** expects that this will lead to more sales of its upcoming first album and increased industry and media visibility.

Winnipeg's **Sarasvati Dramatic Theatre Production and Repertory** hosted Kenyan theatre artists, **Mumbi Kaigwa** and **Isaac Anyanga**, with a **\$2,500** grant from the **Theatre** section's **Visiting Foreign Artists Program**. From October 19 to 28, 2007, **Kaigwa** and **Anyanga** performed at FemFest 2008, met with artists and members of the Kenyan community, spoke at the University of Winnipeg, conducted workshops for the Manitoba Theatre for Young People's Young Company and the general public, and facilitated workshops hosted by Arts and Cultural Industries Manitoba, Graffiti Art Gallery and the Manitoba Writers Guild. According to **Sarasvati Productions**, the project was of great value to the artists, the organization and the community.

First-time grant applicant and recipient, **Opaskwayak Cree Nation (OCN)** received **\$10,000** through the **Elder/Youth Legacy Program: Support for Aboriginal Artistic Practices** to conduct its **Hide Tanning Project**. The project allowed 10 grade six and seven students from Joe A. Ross School in Opaskwayak to participate in a six-week enrichment course to learn hands-on traditional hide preparation. Guided by Elders **Joe Bignell, John G. Sinclair, Nellie Constant** and **Flora Crane**, students learned to identify animals, catch fur, and prepare artistic pelts. According to **Bignell**, the project provided “an excellent opportunity for **OCN** youth to appreciate our [the Elders’] traditional knowledge.”

Through the **Grants to Dance Professionals: Emerging/Mid-Career** program, **Freya Olafson** of Winnipeg was awarded **\$4,000** to participate in the Springboard Dance Project in Montreal from June 25 to July 13, 2007. The Springboard Dance Project connects emerging dancers and young choreographers with established artists and companies through intensive workshops, apprenticeships and mentorships. **Olafson** was invited as one of four selected choreographers and under the mentorship of **Hélène Blackburn**, artistic director and choreographer of Cas Public, she worked with five dancers on an installation dance piece entitled **Being and Becoming**.

In October 2007, Winnipeg ceramic artist **Grace Nickel** traveled to China to participate in the Sino-Canada Ceramic Art Exchange Program with **\$2,500** from the **Visual Arts** section’s **Travel Grants to Professional Artists** program. During the month-long residency, **Nickel** created work to be displayed permanently in the new Canadian Ceramic Museum, one of 10 international ceramic museums built in preparation for the 2008 Beijing Olympics. While creating work for the Canadian showcase, **Nickel** was influenced by the cultural environment in China, with its rich tradition in ceramic art and more specifically by the Fuping Pottery Art Village where she worked collaboratively with other visiting international ceramic artists.

Through the **Grants to Professional Writers - Creative Writing** program, Métis author **Deborah Delaronde-Falk** of Duck Bay received **\$6,000** to research and write **The Rabbit’s Race**, a children’s picture storybook. **Delaronde-Falk**, recipient of the Lieutenant Governor’s Medal for Literacy (2002), plans to follow the tradition of Aboriginal legends, by having morals and values emerge naturally from the story. **The Rabbit’s Race** will narrate parallel stories of a grandfather storyteller and an elderly jackrabbit, conveying the wisdom of grandparents and their value in the lives of young people.

The **Winnipeg Film Group Inc.** received a **Media Arts Project Grant** of **\$20,000** to develop the **Women’s Mosaic Film Project** from February 2008 to January 2009. The project will be coordinated with **Mentoring Artists for Women’s Art (MAWA)**, an organization supporting the intellectual and creative development of women and will aim to increase the participation of women of Aboriginal or diverse cultural backgrounds in the Winnipeg and Manitoba film industries. The two successful applicants will benefit from a mentor’s technical and creative guidance, training from the **Winnipeg Film Group**, a living expense honorarium, a production assistance award and services from the **Winnipeg Film Group** for the completion of an independent short film or video.

With a **\$1,500** grant from the **Travel Grants to Professional Musicians** program, **Colleen Skull** of Winnipeg traveled to France to participate in the International Singing Competition of Toulouse and the Marseille International Opera Competition in September 2007. According to **Skull**, “the opportunity to perform and be coached in French repertoire in France is an invaluable experience.” Working with French coaches, musicians and conductors, she developed and showcased her repertoire, making new contacts with international managers and artistic directors, to foray successfully into the European operatic community.

Winnipeg’s **Manitoba Theatre for Young People (MTYP)** was awarded **\$9,000** through the **Theatre Touring and Special Initiatives Program** to tour its production, ***Skinny Lie***, to Northern Manitoba in April and May 2007. The performance of ***Skinny Lie***, a children’s play focusing on body image, honesty, loyalty and friendship, reached 6,000 grade two to seven children from 15 remote community schools. Grand Rapids School commented: “It is good for students to see a play rather than watch a movie, video or TV, as they learn to use their imaginations. I think it’s wonderful that **MTYP** comes into the schools. Many of our children would never otherwise have the opportunity to see productions like these.”

In 2007-08, curator, writer and media artist **Steven Loft** of Winnipeg was selected to participate in the **Aboriginal Curatorial Residency: A Collaborative Project of the Canada Council for the Arts and the National Gallery of Canada** program. **Loft** was the director of Urban Shaman: Contemporary Aboriginal Art, an Aboriginal artist-run centre in Winnipeg, and was previously First Nations curator-in-residence at the Art Gallery of Hamilton and artistic director of Hamilton’s Native/Inuit Photographers’ Association. During his two-year residency, he plans to expand his curatorial practice and pursue “research and scholarship in contemporary Canadian and international indigenous aesthetic movement, from a specific Aboriginal perspective.”

Frank Hawthorne was selected as the 2008 winner of the **Killam Prize in the Natural Sciences** and received **\$100,000**. **Hawthorne** is a Distinguished Professor at the University of Manitoba, the holder of a Tier I Canada Research Chair and an Officer of the Order of Canada (2006). Having published over 500 refereed papers in scientific journals, he was listed by ScienceWatch as the world’s most cited mineralogist of the last decade and the world’s third most cited geologist during the same period. The mineral *Frankhawthorneite* was named after him for his work on copper-oxysalt minerals. **Hawthorne** was awarded the prize in recognition of distinguished career contributions to the fields of Geology and Mineralogy. The Killam Prizes were established in memory of Izaak Walton Killam through the Will of his wife, Dorothy J. Killam, to support advanced academic achievements in Canada and are administered by the Canada Council.

4.0 Overall arts and culture funding in Manitoba from all three levels of government⁶

- Arts and culture funding to Manitoba from all three levels of government stood at \$262.4 million in 2003-04 (the latest year of overall data from Statistics Canada).
- Provincial funding made up the largest share at about 43% (\$111.8 million) with another 32% (\$85.1 million) coming from federal sources. 25% (\$65.5 million) of total government expenditures to Manitoba came from municipal sources.
- Federal government cultural funding to Manitoba totalling \$85.1 million is primarily concentrated (92%) in four areas – heritage resources (historic parks/sites and nature/provincial parks), broadcasting, performing arts and film and video. The remaining 8% is allocated to areas including multidisciplinary arts (\$2.0 million), literary arts (\$1.7 million) and visual arts and craft (\$1.6 million). In the comparable year (2003-04), Canada Council funding accounted for 7% of all federal culture spending in Manitoba.
- Between 1999-00 and 2003-04, federal cultural spending in Manitoba decreased from \$95 million to \$85.1 million respectively (a decrease of 10%). During the same period, Canada Council funding to Manitoba increased from \$5.4 million to \$6.1 million.
- The largest part of provincial government funding is concentrated in four areas – libraries, heritage resources, multidisciplinary arts and performing arts (92% or \$102.6 million). However, funding is also allocated by the provincial government to film and video (\$3.2 million), visual arts and crafts (\$1.3 million) and arts education (\$1.2 million).

Canada Council for the Arts funding to Manitoba

- Since 1999-00, Canada Council funding to Manitoba has increased, rising from \$5.4 million in 1999-00 to \$6.7 million in 2007-08 (an increase of 24.85%).
- Grants to Manitoba as a percentage of total Canada Council funding has dropped somewhat from 5.21% in 1999-00 to 4.39% in 2007-08.

Grant applications from Manitoba

- Since 1999-00, the total number of grant applications from Manitoba artists and arts organizations has decreased from 495 applications in 1999-00 to 405 applications in 2007-08. There has been an 18.18% decrease in the number of grant applications from Manitoba since 1999-00 while Canada Council as a whole has seen a decrease of 1.14%.
